2016 GENERAL RULES PRIOR TO MAKING PROPER ENTRY FOR THE FAIR

Specific rules will be found at the beginning of departments, divisions, and classes.

General Rules

- 1. The Fremont County Fair Board reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations, and their decision will be final.
- Entries shall be limited to articles produced or made in Fremont County in 2015/2016 and the sole work of the exhibitor; unless noted in the department being entered.
- 3. All exhibitors MUST RESIDE IN Fremont County.
- 4. Exhibits must be entered online or official entry forms located in this guide. Forms available at the fair office or the extension offices. Junior Show/ Youth Show, 4-H and FFA entry forms must be signed by a parent(s) or guardian(s).
- 5. Entry tags are to be attached to each exhibit and must remain attached during the entire exhibition. Attach entry tag to the upper left corner of the exhibit when possible. Animals and contest divisions do not receive entry tags. All entry tags must be picked up at the Fair Office. Exhibitors must deliver their exhibits with tags attached to the department superintendent in charge.
- Any individual entering an article in another name other than that of the bona fide owner, or misrepresenting any facts, shall not be allowed to compete for or receive any premiums and may be barred from any current or future showing.
- 7. Erroneously entered exhibits may be transferred to the proper division prior to judging by the superintendent of the department.
- 8. Only one entry per individual will be allowed in any one class; unless otherwise specified in the department division. Only articles for class competition listed in this catalog will be accepted for entry.
- Exhibitors will at all times, give the necessary personal attention to their exhibits during the fair and take charge of the same immediately after the close of fair.
- 10. The greatest care possible will be used by the Fremont County Fair to prevent loss, theft, or injury to any articles exhibited. In no case, shall the Fair Board or Fair Management become responsible

- for any loss by natural causes; fire, theft or injury. Those desiring insurance on the entered articles must make their own arrangements for such coverage.
- 11. Only amateurs may compete in Open Class for prizes unless otherwise stated. Exceptions will be listed in each Open Class department.
- 12. Grievances and Protests must be submitted in writing to the Fair Office, for review by the Fair Board.
- 13. Anyone removing an exhibit before the release times listed in this 2016 Fair Guide, without written permission from the Fair Board, will forfeit all premiums and privileges as an exhibitor.
- 14. Judges will have absolute control in the show ring or departments at the time of judging. No exhibitor or spectator may interfere with the judging of exhibits. The judge shall be empowered to give any individual exhibit second or third place even though it may be the only entry in that class. Decision of the judge shall be final, except in the case of fraud or protest.

In consideration of my participation in the Fremont County Fair, I do hereby (for myself or my executors and administrators) waive, release, and forever discharge the Fremont County Fair Board, the Fremont County Fair employees and volunteers, the Fremont County Extension Staff, and the Board of Commissioners of Fremont County from any and all legal claims or liability on my behalf for any loss, damage, or injuries from participation in the Fremont County Fair.

I understand that livestock can be both dangerous and unpredictable, but willingly assume all risk of my participation in the Fremont County Fair. I further understand that I will be responsible for any damage done by my livestock. I agree to abide by current Wyoming State Animal Health regulations and meet the Wyoming Livestock Health and Brand Requirements.

GUEST AND EXHIBITOR REGULATIONS AT THE FREMONT COUNTY FAIR

WELCOME:

The Fremont County Fair encourages your participation in this year's events. The Fremont County Fair Board and fair management look forward to hosting you and your exhibits at the fair grounds and welcomes you to Riverton, Wyoming home of the Fremont County Fair and Rodeo

FAIR DATES:

The 103rd Fremont County Fair will be held at the fair grounds in Riverton, WY, August 1 - August 6, 2016. unless postponed, shortened or extended by the Fremont County Fair Board, all of which they hereby claim and reserve the right to do, from any cause whatsoever, which they may deem necessary for the general good of all concerned.

INTERPRETATION OF POLICY AND REGULATIONS:

The Fremont County Fair reserves to the Fair Board and Fair Management the final and absolute right to interpret these policies and regulations and to arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of or connected with or incident to the Fair, and the right to amend or add to these policies as its judgment may determine. An exhibitor who violates any of the following policies, rules and/or regulations may forfeit all privileges, fees paid; awards and/or premiums won and be subject to such penalty as may be ordered. **LIABILITY STATEMENT**:

All exhibitors and exhibits must comply with the policies and regulations of the Fremont County Fair, but the Fair will in no case be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur. Each exhibitor will be solely responsible for any consequential or other loss, injury or damage done to, or occasioned by, or arising from, any animal or article exhibited by him/her and for its description as given in the premium book, and shall indemnify the Fremont County Fair against all legal or other proceedings in regard thereto, as well as damage or injury to any other person or property, caused by the exhibitor, or any of the animals exhibited by him/her, or arising out of, or in any way connected with, such exhibition of any of the animals so exhibited.

Personal Conduct: The following conduct is prohibited:

- Any use, possession, or sale of any controlled substance is prohibited.
- Any use, possession, or sale of alcoholic beverages by minors is prohibited. Consumption of alcoholic beverages is allowed in the beer garden and private campground residences only.
- Anyone engaging in a fight, disorderly conduct or use of profane language will be removed from the premises.
- 4. Smoking is allowed in outdoor designated areas only.
- The wearing or display of any gang related clothing or paraphernalia is prohibited. This includes bandanas, dew rags, colors, or any other items indicating any membership in a gang.
- Please refer to Junior Livestock Show Rules for acceptable dress code while an exhibitor in competition (in the show ring and sale ring).

MOTORIZED VEHICLES:

Use of any motorized vehicles will be prohibited on the fairgrounds. This includes golf/carts (gas and electric) scooters, motorcycles, and ATV's. Specific exceptions for the Fremont County Fair Board and fair staff. Persons with disabilities and/or specific injuries may request an exemption which is to be requested in person or in writing and approved 30 days in advance of fair dates, by the Fair Board.

LIVESTOCK:

The livestock facilities will be closed to the general public at 10:00p.m. each evening.

VIOLATIONS:

Any violation of these rules will result in removal from the fairgrounds, with no allowance to return for the duration of the current Fremont County Fair.

FIRE REGULATIONS: No Smoking in any buildings, open air or enclosed. No containers containing flammable liquids will be allowed in any buildings. No liquified petroleum fueled or flammable or combustible liquid-fuel generators or other devices are allowed on grounds.

DOGS ON FAIRGROUNDS: The Fremont County Fair Board has established the following Guidelines and Policy for a dog on the fairgrounds during the Fremont County Fair.

- 1. Dogs entered in fair events, may be on grounds during <u>authorized</u> fair entertainment events and sanctioned county fair dog shows/events. Dogs may be allowed only in a designated camper area of the campgrounds and livestock/rodeo trailer area. Dogs are not allowed outside of these designated areas <u>at any</u> time during the fair.
- a. All dogs must be on a leash or immediate verbal control. There shall be no loose or unattended dogs at anytime in the areas designated.
- 2. All dogs must have current health records documentation, meeting the minimum standards as set by the State of Wyoming, as well as for the City of Riverton, when entering the fairgrounds.
- as well as for the City of Riverton, when entering the fairgrounds.

 3. No dogs will be permitted in the animal barns at any time!

 4. Commercial exhibitors or vendors may have a dog(s), but only on a leash in their allocated campground space. No food vendors shall have dogs in their food space at any time.
- shall have dogs in their food space at any time.
 5. While in the designated areas, dog owners or handlers shall be: responsible for clean-up of the animal's excrement, responsible at all times for the control of, noise from, or any damages caused by the dog.
- 6. There may be one warning given by fair management for any violation, however, upon any subsequent violation, management may have the dog removed from the fairground property at the complete expense of the owner or handler.

These rules will be strictly enforced and apply to exhibitors and their employees, as well as to Fremont County Fair visitors.

Note: These policies do not apply to official service dogs for those individuals with an impairment.

No foreign foliage should appear in single variety exhibits. Mixed bouquets should not be entered in the specimen classes. Display the number of stems requested.
- The container used for specimen of cut flowers should be clear, glass jars suitable to the size of the specimen. The department takes no responsibility for containers brought for exhibits.
- 3. Exhibitors in this department may replace exhibits with fresh flowers any time during the week.
- 4. Judging of entries in this department are to be based on the following characteristics: a) cultural perfection, b) true color to type, c) exact number of blooms.
- 5. One entry per class per exhibitor.
- Entries must be tagged and checked in with super intendent.
- 7. If the exhibit needs support or a display stand, the exhibitor must provide.
- 8. Sweepstakes and Best of Show awards will be determined by the person acquiring the most points by ribbons in this division. Values are Blue: 3 pts, Red: 2 pts, White: 1 pt.
- Youth Classes ages 9-18 years. Each exhibit shall be scored as blue, red, or white. Youth are encouraged to enter any floriculture class. Divisions 702, 704, 706, 708 are for youth!

Definitions

Bloom: one individual flower (example: rose).

Spike: several flowers on a long stem (example: gladiolus).

Spray: single stem with terminal buds or flowers and two or more auxillary buds, flowers and foliage. (example: petunia). **Stem**: main ascending part of plant, not over 18 inches (example: delphinium).

*Entries will be judged on uniformity of bloom size and color.

HOW TO HARDEN OFF YOUR FLOWER EXHIBIT

If a flower is to remain fresh throughout the exhibit period, it should be cut no later than the day before it is to be exhibited. It is generally recognized that afternoon-especially cutting in late afternoon, when the greatest amount of sugar has ascended into the leaves and blooms - as well as a "hardening off" process will help insure a winning entry.

Flower stems should be cut cleanly at an angle with a sharp knife or pruning shears and plunged into deep, hot water: 110 degrees Fahrenheit is ideal. Plunging plants up to their necks in cool water works as well. It is a good practice to carry a bucket of water to the garden and to place each cut specimen in the water at once. Lightly crush the base of woody stems on plants such as lilacs to improve the intake of water. some flowers, such as Dahlias, Euphorbias and Poppies, need to have the cut tips seared over an open flame.

Following cutting and water treatment, specimens should be placed in a cool, darkened room. After several hours, when the water has come to room temperature, add ice to the water and leave the flower material undisturbed overnight or place flowers in a refrigerator or cooler at a temperature between 38 and 40 degrees for six or more hours before they are to be shown. Flowers prepared in this way improve their substance and will hold their freshness longer.

For 2016 the Riverton Garden Club will host a "short time" question and answer session with the floricluture judge(s) following the completion of judging, Aug. 4.

VEGETABLES, HERBS, & FRUITS DIVISION 802-804

Rules

Variety and type (trueness to variety)- 10% Uniformity of individual samples- 10% Quality (size for table use, texture)- 60% Condition, marketability- 20%

 - A. Fresh and of the same variety
 - B. Uniform in color and size (avoid oversized samples)
 - C. Mature, but not overripe
 - D. Free from decay, blemishes, growth cracks, sun scald, wilt or freezing
 - E. Free from damage (worms, insect, mechanical, hail, or disease).
- 3. Enter Dept. 8, DIVISION 802, Class____.

ASPARAGUS – Should be tender and firm with close compact tips. The stalks should be green for almost the entire length, taper uniformly, the same diameter at the butt and the same length.

BEANS, **LIMA** – Pods should be well-filled and dark green color.

BEETS, TABLE – Diameter should be $2 - 2\frac{1}{2}$ ". Side rootlets should be removed, and taproot should be left on. Trim the tops, leaving 1" of leaf stalk above the crown.

BROCCOLI – Heads should be compact, not less than 3" in diameter and dark green. Cut the stems squarely above the first whorl of leave, to give a 5" overall length.

BRUSSEL SPROUTS – All the heads should be firm, compact, and a good green color. Heads not less than 1" in diameter and should be smoothly trimmed to ½".

CABBAGE – Heads should be firm, heavy in comparison to size. Midribs should be large and the leaves should not be too closely trimmed. Leave stem ¼" long to hold leaves firmly.

CARROTS – Select carrots that are smooth, straight, deep orange in color and free from greening at the top. Specimens should be typical of their variety. Cut off foliage to 1". **CAULIFLOWER** – Heads should be pure white and solid. The florets should be close. No leaves should appear throughout the head. Trim the green outer leaves to 1" above the head. Trim the butt or stem to allow 4 top leaves to remain.

CORN, SWEET – Ears should be well formed and filled out to the tip. Kernels should be soft, tender and filled with thick opaque, milky juice. Should be husked and trimmed for judging, free of silks. The shank should be trimmed $\frac{1}{4}$ " from the base of the cob. The tip of the ear may be neatly clipped, although only a small portion of the cob should be removed; not over $\frac{1}{2}$ ".

CUCUMBERS, PICKLING – Not more than 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ " in diameter and 4" or less long, fairly straight, with blunt ends. Clean by gently brushing with a soft brush to avoid removing the spines. Trim stem to $\frac{1}{4}$ ".

CUCUMBERS, SLICING – Straight, firm, not overgrown, but should be uniformly medium or dark green, 6-9" long. Clean by gently brushing with a soft brush to avoid reducing the natural bloom. Cut the stem of to ½".

EGGPLANT – Specimens should be smooth, firm heavy but not too large. Select for uniform purple coloring, free from bronzing and greening. Wipe with soft cloth, but do not wash. Trim stem to 1".

ENDIVE – Should have a creamy-white heart formation with a 4" or more spread when the head is opened as far as possible without breaking the leaves. Leaves should be fresh, tender, crisp and free from blemishes. Trim roots ½" from the outer leaf stems.

GHERKIN – Separate from cucumbers, as the gherkin and cucumbers are different species. Not more than 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ " in diameter and not more than 3" long. Trim the stem to $\frac{1}{4}$ " from the outer leaf stems.

KOHLRABI – Specimens should not be hard, woody, or pithy. They should be 2 or 3" in diameter and very smooth. Skin should be easily punctured by thumbnail. Clean, but do not wash. Cut off the root portion just below the ball.

LETTUCE, HEAD – Should be crisp, firm, clean, and free from damage. Remove loose and damaged outer leaves. Cut off the stem ½" from the bottom leaf.

MUSKMELON, (CANTALOUPE) – Should be fully ripe, picked on "full slip". If several days elapse between picking date and exhibition, they may be picked on "half slip" and permitted to ripen, with stems attached.

ONIONS – Should be clean. Avoid large size, but should not be less than 2" in diameter. The bulbs should have most of their thin paper skin intact. Do not peel so as to give a slick appearance. The tops should be small and trimmed to 1". The roots should be trimmed, but not completely removed. PARSLEY – Free from dirt, yellowing or discolored leaves. Should be fresh, bright green in color. Each bunch should be 2 or 3" at the butt. Trim stems neatly to be 8-10" in length. PARSNIPS – Roots firm, smooth, tapering evenly, small in diameter (1 ½ "-1 ¼"), with side roots trimmed. Should be light cream color with the taproot left on. Trim top to 1". PEAS – Pods should be fresh, bright green and well filled with tender peas. Green calyxes should be attached.

PEPPERS – Sweet green peppers should be healthy green with no reddish blush or other discoloration. Sweet red or yellow peppers should have healthy, clear red or yellow color with no greenish tinges. Leave stem on and trim to 1" long. **PUMPKIN**, **PIE** – Do not wash; may be brushed clean. Leave stem attached and trim to 1".

RADISHES, WINTER – The flesh should be crisp and tender, nonpithy. Trim leaf to $\frac{1}{2}$ ".

RHUBARB – All stalks should be uniform in color, shape, size and texture. Each stalk should be at least ½"-1"across its flat face at the center of the length. Length after trimming should be at least 10". Stalks should be tender, crisp, fresh, not pithy, and limp or wilted. Neatly trim and top, leaving 1" of leaves and prongs. The stalks should be pulled when harvested, not cut off. The basal husks should be removed from the bottom of the stalks.

SALSIFY (OYSTER PLANT) – Small or medium size, $\frac{1}{2}$ – 1" diameter at the thickest part. Length should be 6" or more. Roots should be straight and smooth evenly tapered. Rootlets and side roots should be removed. Brush off the dirt; do not wash. Trim to 1".

SQUASH, SUMMER – Pick when small (best eating, 4-7"'s, depending on variety). The shell should be extremely soft, fairly tender, and having undeveloped seeds. Brush clean; do not wash. Trim stem to 1" long.

SWISS CHARD – Must be fresh, crisp, with bright green leaves and clear white or red stems. Clean by washing. If necessary, trim off roots and trim butts to a triangle.

TOMATOES – Ripe, solid, and without stems. Leave stems on the pickling or preserving types.

TURNIPS – Medium size, 1 $\frac{3}{4}$ "or 2 $\frac{3}{4}$ " in diameter. Flesh should be crisp, fine-grained, and not pithy. Should be clean and bright in color, but not washed. Smooth; firm with secondary roots removed but with 2-3" of tap root remaining. Trim top to 1".

WATERMELON – Should be mature, but not overripe. Wipe off dirt, but do not wash. Leave stem to 1" long.

The Wool Show encourages improved wool production, stimulates interest and knowledge in the proper preparation of wool for market and informs the public on the versatile uses of wool as a high quality textile fiber.

1. Entry deadline is Friday, July 8, 2016. Youth Ex-

- hibitors who wish to exhibit in the Open Wool Show <u>must</u> Pre-enter by the entry deadline.
- 2. Exhibitors will abide by all natural fiber and applicable policies governing the 2016 Fremont County Fair. Please use the Open Class Exhibits entry form in the back of this guide for all wool show entries.
- 3. Exhibitors may enter two (2) fleeces in any one class, and entries may be made in as many classes as desired. An individual fleece may be entered in one class only. Youth exhibitors may enter the Open Show, but must have different fleeces in each division.
- **4.** After screening and judging, some fleeces may be removed, so that the higher placing fleeces can be properly displayed for public view during the fair.
- **ELIGIBILITY OF FLEECES**: Each fleece must: (a) have been grown in Fremont County by a resident wool grower; (b) have been shorn in 2015 or 2016 (fleeces entered in the 2015 County Fair or State Fair, cannot be entered again); and (c) represent 12 months growth or less; yearling fleeces will be allowed 16 months growth (d) Wether fleeces are to be entered in the Ram Fleece class only.
- **CRITERION**: Fleeces shall be faulted for: (a) not being tied with paper twine; (b) paints or tar brands (soluble branding fluids allowed); (c) excessive dung locks or tags; (d) moisture discoloration; (e) being cotted; (f) a break or weak staple; (g) excess burrs or vegetable matter. Fleeces showing black fiber will be disqualified.
- PREPARATION OF FLEECES: Spread out the fleece on a clean table or floor, skin side down, taking care not to pull or open fleece as it is handled. Before rolling, remove all heavy tags, stained wool, and obvious foreign matter. Roll the fleece in four steps: (1) Begin at one side and loosely fold 8 to 10 inches of the edge toward the center of the fleece. (2) Do the same on the other side, but fold toward the center two times-until the twice folded portion lies on top of the first fold. (3) Fold in the head wool. (4) Roll from the breach toward the shoulder and long side wool. Fleece is now ready to be tied. Using paper fleece twine, wrap it in two directions and tie as you would a package. There should be no loose ends hanging from the fleece. It should be loose enough to make judging easy, yet compact enough to not fall apart when handled.
- 5. If a fleece is from a purebred sheep, write the breed and gender of the sheep on a 3x5 card and attach it to the entry tag.

At least one handler must be 18 years of age or older. For the safety of the dogs, handlers are not permitted to leave their designated places while the dogs are competing.
- 5. We will not be using a starting gate. Owners will stand at the starting line and hold their dog. Once the dogs are settled behind the starting line, the announcer will state, "Ready, Set, Go" and the handlers will release the dog. Please allow your dog to run freely from the starting line of his/her own accord. Any handler releasing the dog before "go" will be disqualified at the discretion of the racing officials.
- 6. Once the dog has been released the finish line handler can attract the dogs' attention to the finish line, snacks, squeaky toys, etc. may be used to coax your dog. No loud noises, other live animals or anything deemed to be disruptive to other dogs will be permitted.

 - Entries released: Sunday, August 7, 9 am to 3 pm and Monday, August 8, 8 am to 5 pm.
- 3. Competition is open to all registered Fremont County Girl Scouts who are in good standing of the Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. Only 1 entry is allowed in each class and the Scout can enter exhibits in only one division (Daisy, Junior, etc.) with the exception of Daisys who can exhibit in Divisions 1501 and 1502 and Cadettes who can exhibit in Division 1503 and 1504. Classification for entries will be made on Scout registration from July, 2015 to June, 2016
- 4. Girl Scout entries must include a label with the name of the project, your troop number and description of how the project was made. Exhibit articles must have been made by the exhibitor since the 2015 Fremont County
- 5. Classification will be made by the school grade of August 2015 through June, 2016.

Classification for entries will be made on Scout registration from July, 2015 to June, 2016.

RULES FOR YOUTH LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS 4-H & FFA OWNERSHIP OF ANIMAL EXHIBITS

MANDATORY ANIMAL HEALTH INSPECTION

All animals entering the Fairgrounds must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection from a licensed Veterinarian within 7 days prior to arrival at the fair.

ELIGIBILITY TO ENTER:

- Open to all regularly enrolled or officially transferred Fremont County 4-H or FFA members. Members must be entered in the appropriate livestock project and be in good standing.
- AGE REQUIREMENTS: To be eligible to exhibit animals at the Fremont County Fair, youth must be eight years of age, but not more than nineteen years of age as of January 1, 2016. Eligibility to exhibit breeding animals only, is extended to FFA members who are not more than 21 years of age as of January 1, 2016.

OWNERSHIP DATES AND TAGGING:

- 3. ALL MARKET LIVESTOCK MUST HAVE BEEN TAGGED AT OFFICIAL FREMONT COUNTY TAGGINGS. All 4-H and FFA advisors will be made aware of scheduled dates and locations annually. Exhibitors are responsible for obtaining information about location and dates for tagging, as well as for ensuring their market animals are tagged with official Fremont County Tags. This is not the responsibility of leaders or advisors.
- 4. **OWNERSHIP**: All breeding beef, market beef and dairy animals must be owned by exhibitors by February 1, 2016. All sheep, swine, rabbits, poultry, dogs, and goats must be owned by June 1, 2016. The exhibitor must own the animal(s) they exhibit.

HOW TO ENTER THE FAIR:

- Competition Guides and livestock entry forms are to be picked up from your FFA Advisor or 4-H Community Leader or enter online at fremontcountyfair.org.
- 6. ALL LIVESTOCK ARE TO BE ENTERED ON AN OFFI-CIAL FAIR ENTRY BLANK. ENTRY BLANKS MUST BE SIGNED BY BOTH THE EXHIBITOR AND HIS/HER PARENT OR GUARDIAN. If you are showing animals as part of your 4-H project and FFA project, be sure to use two entry blanks; one for your 4-H animals and one for your FFA animals.
- Exhibitors may enter a maximum of 3 Market Lambs, 3 Market Hogs, 3 Market Goats, and 3 Market Beef. In breeding and feeder classes, each exhibitor may have

2 animals per class. Entry example: if you have three market animals in the same class, list the division, class code and description on your entry blank three (3) separate times.

ANIMAL EXHIBITS:

8. Exhibitors can enter an animal in only one youth class.

Exceptions:

- A. Cattle entered in the Commercial Cow Contest can also be entered in a Youth Breeding Beef Class.
- B. Sheep that have been entered in an individual class, may also be entered again in an established group show class.
- C. Market Beef, Goats, Sheep, and Swine, may also be shown in Open Show Breeders Pen of Three.
- D. Horses and Livestock may enter "Open Shows" and "Jackpot Shows" hosted by the fair.
- or pen for his/her animal(s) with their FFA Advisor or Community 4-H Leader. Call your FFA Advisor or Community Leader and ask them to list you on their stall reservation application. Stalls will be assigned according to club and chapter groups. Stall applications will be filled out by FFA Advisors and Community 4-H Leaders. Do not bring "companion animals" to fair, bring only animals that have been entered in fair. Space is limited.
 - Do not ask for extra stalls to house equipment! Equipment space will be designated by species superintendents. You must obtain your pen and location from the show superintendent when you arrive at fair!
- 10. Only animals entered as feeder animals will show in the feeder classes. Animals tagged and entered as market animals that do not make minimum weight or exceed maximum weight requirements, will show in "under/over weight" class-es; not in feeder classes.
- 11. 4-H and FFA orphan lambs must be entered and shown as market or breeding lambs. If they make minimum market weight and are shown in the market class, they are eligible to sell.
- 12. Late entries will be accepted until Friday, July 15, 6 p.m. for a \$10 per person processing fee.

ENTRY RULES:

- Understand that disciplinary action may be taken by Fremont County Fair against individuals who have been verified as committing violations at any other fair or show.
- 14. Exhibitor is to read all Fremont County Fair rules and understands the consequences and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the Fair. The act of entering an animal is also consent that the Fair Board may release information to appropriate law enforcement authorities if there have been infractions of state or federal statutes, regulations, or rules.
- 15. Exhibitors agree to allow saliva, urine, blood, or other body samples to be taken from entered animals, if any testing is deemed necessary by the Fremont County

Fair Board. The presence of prohibited or illegal drugs or medication shall be premia facie evidence that such substances have been administered to the animal internally or externally.

ANIMAL HEALTH AND BRAND INSPECTION PAPERS:

- 16. All animals must conform to current Wyoming brand laws as directed by the Wyoming Livestock Board.
- 17. Brand Inspection papers are to be in the exhibitor's hand and available for review for each species. Brand Inspection papers will be reviewed at the scales for weigh in.
- 18. All exhibitors must abide by the current Wyoming State Animal Health Rules. Exhibitors must obtain a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection from a licensed veterinarian within 7 days of entry to the fair grounds. Animals will not be allowed to enter the fair grounds without a current Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to obtain this inspection and present the papers at the designated location upon arrival, prior to entering the fair grounds.
- 19. Any animal with contagious or communicable diseases will not be allowed on the grounds. Any animal developing health problems during the fair will be evaluated by the respective superintendent and a veterinarian at the discretion of the superintendent. Attention to any matters of concern and/or removal from the fairgrounds will be adhered to by the exhibitor.
 - A. Any Lamb exhibiting any stage of show lamb fungus will not be allowed to enter or remain on the fairarounds.
- 20. The Fair Board will provide veterinarians or designated personnel to provide and review Certificates of Veterinary Inspection, at designated entrances with limited specific arrival time frames.

The times will be as follows:

Thr., July 21 6:00 pm - 9:00 pm Equine (SE: Gate 3) Fri., July 22 7:00 am - 9:30 pm Equine (SE: Gate 3) Sat., July 23 Equine (SE: Gate 3) 7:00 am - 8:30 am Sun., July 31 6:00 am - 12:00 pm Goats, Sheep, Swine Beef & Dairy Cattle (SE: Gate 3) 7:30 am - 10:30 am Rabbits (N: Gate 1) Mon., Aug. 1 Thr., Aug. 4 10:30 am - 1:30 pm Poultry (N: Gate 1)

21. A. No animals allowed on grounds without the current Certificate of Veterinary Inspection being reviewed and must arrive during designated Animal Heath Inspection times only.

- Animals shall not be brought on grounds prior to B. 6:00 a.m., or after 12:00 p.m., Sunday, July 31. Exhibitors in violation of this arrival time will not be eligible for premiums or awards for the current fair, with no recourse.
- 22. Any animal(s) showing symptoms of a contagious or infectious disease may not be allowed to enter or may be removed from the premises a the discretion of the official Veterinarian or their designated representative.
- 23. All sheep and goats must be officially identified with USDA-APHIS approved scrapie identification, as set

forth by Federal and State laws. Identification can be done three ways:

- a) USDA issued official scrapie ID tag, usually a metal clip tag or plastic ear tag.
- b) Registry tattoos for certain purebred goats. Tattooed goats must be accompanied by registration papers. Neckchains for LaMancha goats with registration papers.
- c) Microchip, must be accompanied by official veterinary certificate and exhibitor must bring their own reader.

WEIGHING OF MARKET ANIMALS

24. The Fremont County Fair Board will designate official weigh master(s) for fair. Exhibitors must have brand inspection papers with them at this time. No papers means you are not eligible for the Jr. Livestock Sale!

ANIMAL WEIGHTS:

- A. Beef Minimum sale weight Steers: 1,000 lbs. Minimum sale weight Heifers: 950 lbs. Steers weighing less than 1,000 lbs. and heifers weighing less than 950 lbs. will show for ribbons and premiums, but will not
- Minimum sale weight: 225 lbs. B. Swine Maximum sale weight: 310 lbs. Hogs weighing less than 225 lbs. and hogs weighing over 310 lbs. will show for ribbons and premiums, but will not sell.
- C. Lambs Minimum sale weight: 100 lbs. Lambs weighing less than 100 lbs. will show for ribbons and premiums, but will not sell.
- D. Goats Minimum sale weight: 60 lbs. Goats weighing less than 60 lbs. will show for ribbons and premiums, but will not sell.
- E. Poultry Minimum sale weight: 3.5 lbs. per bird. Birds weighing less than 3.5 lbs. will not sell; birds must average 3.5 lbs or more for the Pen of 3.
- F. Rabbits Minimum sale weight: 3 lbs. per rabbit. Fryers weighing less than 3 lbs. will not sell.
- 1. Market Beef and Heifers will be weighed one time by the fair committee. No weigh backs will be allowed.
- 2. Market hogs, market goats, and market lambs will be weighed one time. No weigh backs will be allowed.
- 3. All market animals will be sorted by a committee at the scales during weigh-in, to determine proper class and proper castration. No cryptorchid animals will be allowed to show or sell. Decision of this committee will be final with no recourse.
- 4. All animals must be dry when they are weighed.
- 5. Lambs and goats must be freshly shorn by July 30, prior to arrival on the fair groounds.

- 26. When youth show animals arrive at the Fair, they are to be placed in the stalls or pens, as assigned by club or chapter, by the species superintendent. The stall charts are posted on the front of each barn. If you need assistance, check with your 4-H leader, FFA advisor, or Show Superintendent. Youth animals must occupy those designated pens or stalls until released, on Sunday, August 7, at 7:00 a.m.
 - A. All stalls and pens must be cleaned before 9:00 a.m. each day and refuse matter disposed of properly in fair designated locations.
 - B. ALL ÁNIMALS MÚST REMAIN IN ASSIGNED STALLS/PENS BETWEEN THE HOURS OF 9:00 A.M. AND 6:30 P.M. DAILY, except during exercising, washing, grooming, and showing.

ANIMAL BEDDING:

- 27. A. First Bedding of wood shaings will be provided by the Fair. It will be the sole responsibility of the exhibitor to secure additional bedding. Exhibitors may use straw for the dairy cattle stalls and breeding sheep pens. In the Beef Barn, no hay or straw to be used as bedding; wood shavings may be used in all barns.
 - B. Replacement/freshening wood shavings may be available. There will be a limit per individual per day.
 - If additional bedding is needed, beyond the established dates and times, please support those businesses who supply shavings in the area. Please do not waste bedding materials.

ANIMAL CARE AT FAIR:

28. While at the fair grounds, exhibitors are expected to care for and feed their animals, maintain clean stalls and walkways. Properly exhibit their livestock, to the best advantage of both the exhibitor and the animal, at all times. Do not tie any animal with its head pulled abnormally high.

STALL PEN SIGNS

29. Stall signs will be provided by the fair and are expected to be properly filled out, put in place upon arrival and maintained by the exhibitor for the duration of the fair. This is a part of Herdsmanship scoring for all exhibitors.

EXHIBITORS EXPECTATIONS:

YOUTH LIVESTOCK SHOW CODE OF ETHICS:

A. Youth Livestock Exhibitors are expected to care for, groom and show their own animals while at the Fremont County Fair. Individual consideration will be given for extenuating circumstances, by written request and approval of the Fair Board.

- B. No exhibitor may show a market animal which has been previously sold at another fair, Junior Livestock Show Sale, or auction as a market animal.
- C. Direct criticism or interference of the judge, show management, other exhibitors, or show officials before, during or after the fair, is prohibited and may have severe consequences as determined by the Fair Board.
- D. While at the fair, the exhibitor shall notify the barn/ show superintendent if their animal becomes sick. The barn/show superintendent shall be notified before any medication, oral or injectable is administered.
- E. Abusive or inhumane treatment of any animal will not be allowed while handling, fitting or showing, or at any time during the Fremont County Fair. Striking an animal to cause swelling or for bracing purposes is not allowed, and the use of electrical devices will not be permitted and will be grounds for dismissal.
- F. All animals that will enter the food chain shall be free of all residue and foreign substance. Treatment of an animal internally or externally with any irritant, or other substances used to change the conformation or appearance of an animal is prohibited. The use of tranquilizers, sedatives, or depressants which alter the physical or physiological state of the animal is prohibited. Injections or insertion of any foreign material under the skin and/or into the flesh of any animal is prohibited.
- G. The abnormal balancing of breeding animal's udders is prohibited.
- H. All animals are expected to be kept clean and provided with an adequate nutritional diet with plenty of clean, fresh water for their stay at the County Fair. Drenching as a method to source nutrition for an animal is prohibited. Only in the case of a licensed veterinarian prescribing an animal health need to utilize drenching is allowed.
- I. Any animal sold at the Junior Livestock Sale shall be the same animal delivered to the buyer, live or processed. Exhibitors shall be reminded that a sale of any animal at the Junior Livestock Sale, is a binding contract of sale, and therefore prosecutable by breach of contract. Delivering an animal to your buyer live or processed, which was not the animal purchased would fall under breach of contract. Prior arrangements are to be made with the buyer (i.e. if the animal purchased dies before an animal is transferred and the buyer agrees to a replacement animal, live or processed, rather than compensation).

FITTING AND SHOWING YOUR ANIMALS:

- 30. Exhibitors are to do your own work. Accept only advice and support from others. This is your project, to benefit and learn from. Value this "opportunity and privilege to show off your efforts".
- 31. Exhibitors must be able to control their livestock for weigh-in and showing; otherwise animals will be disqualified and must be removed from the fair grounds. Members must accompany and exhibit their own live-

- stock. In cases of two animals in the same class, another Fremont County 4-H or FFA member may show one of the animals. While in the show ring, the person showing the animal must do so without aid. All adults, except those appointed to be in the show ring, must remain away from the animals, unless helping to secure a loose or runaway animal. In "Showmanship" classes you must exhibit your own animal.
- 32. Any violation of the following policies will result in immediate disqualification of the exhibitor in the Youth Show. Further forfeiture of awards, future privileges and disciplinary action may be taken by the Fair Board.
- A. No artificial color, paint, powders or color additives are allowed on animals.
- B. No use of any grooming material on an entry that when rubbed with a glove or cloth, shows evidence of artifical color.
- C. No use of any artificial tail head, tail fin, artificial poll; adding any hair or hair-like substance to any part of the body is prohibited. No showing of livestock of any ineligible age or showing unethically fitted livestock. Unethical fitting is deemed to consist of any method which alters the natural conformation of any part of the animal's body, or any animal having been operated on or tampered with for the purpose of concealing faults or with the intent to deceive.
- D. The attempted surgical or non-surgical alteration of conformation of an animal is prohibited, except for dehorning. Animals are to be shown in their natural conformation.
- E. The dying, or artifical changing of existing color pattern and/or color is prohibited.
- F. FITTING A 4-H or FFA member is expected to fit their own animals at fair. If additional support is needed, only regularly enrolled Fremont County 4-H or FFA members are allowed to assist; the exhibitor must still perform the work.
- G. ASSISTANCE any assistance given to a 4-H or FFA member should be a learning experience for the member. A teacher or adult leader is only allowed to show and teach a member a fitting or showing technique or skill on the animal prior to the show. However, the exhibitor is expected to perform the majority of the technique or skill required.
- 33. While showing or selling animals, the exhibitor shall always appear neat and well groomed. Use good sportsmanship, showmanship, and character; be honest and adhere to rules and ethics herein stated.
- 34. Dress Code:
 - Allowed: Collared shirts (cap sleeve, short sleeve or long sleeve no sleeveless). Shirts that button up to the neck, polo shirts.
 - Not Allowed: T-shirts, tank tops, halter tops, tubetops. No Mid-riffs (Stomachs) showing. NO shorts. No sandals.

You will be asked to leave the show ring or sale ring if you do not adhere to the dress code. No exceptions. RELEASE FROM THE FAIR:

35. All livestock exhibits will be released on Sunday, August 7, at &;00 a.m. No early release unless for extenuating circumstances, with a request in writing, from the Fair Board with Board approval in advance. Assigned pens or stalls are to be cleaned before leaving the fair and approved as acceptable, by the species superintendent. A fine of \$20.00 per pen shall be levied for assigned pens/stalls not cleaned properly.

ENFORCEMENT OF RULES:

36. If an Infraction of the Rules occurs, please notify: First – The species/building Superintendent Second – Fair Board Member(s)

Third – The Fair Director

Each report of rules violation will be reviewed by the Fair Board and appropriate action will be taken. Punishments range from a board review to loss of privilege to show at the Fremont County Fair for the future and violation maybe reported to law enforcement If the matter is not resolved to your satisfaction, you may file a grievance/protest under protocol defined as follows:

PROTESTS & GRIEVANCE

All formal protests or grievances must be submitted in writing, be properly signed and accompanied by \$50 cash or certified check (refundable only if protest or grievance is sustained). The protest must plainly state the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the Fair Director immediately after the occasion for protest or grievance. A protest pertaining to eligibility is most suitable when submitted prior to judging. Judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation. Depending on the basis of the protest, interested parties may be notified and given the opportunity to submit supporting evidence. A decision may be withheld until a complete investigation can be made. No complaint or appeal that an official fair judge overlooked an entry will be considered. If no fault is found in the case of a grievance or protest, the \$50 shall be forfeited. In the case a grievance or protest is filed against any specific party and no fault is found, the \$50 will be forfeited to the party against whom the grievance or protest is found. If the protest or grievance does not involve a specific party and no fault is found, the \$50 will be forfeited to the Fair Board to be deposited in the general fund for awards and will be used to off set operational expenses of awards for the youth program.

37. The Fremont County Fair Board reserves the right to test any animal officially entered in any division for foreign substances including drugs, chemicals, or feed additives. As a prior condition to accepting any entry, an entry form signed by the exhibitor, their parent or legal guardian grants the Fremont County Fair permission to test the entry.

THE FREMONT COUNTY FAIR BOARD RESERVES THE FINAL RIGHT TO INTERPRET THESE RULES AND REGULATIONS AND THEIR DECISION WILL BE FINAL.

ARRIVAL FOR FAIR

- Your beef superintendents will be at the fairgrounds Saturday, July 30; between 10 am and 5 pm for exhibitors to bring in tack for their animals, if you choose to do so.
- Official arrival of animals is Sunday, July 31; from 6 am to 12 noon.
- Please note, absolutely NO tack or animals prior to or outside of the times listed above. Any tack placed outside of the times listed will be subject to being removed / confiscated by the superintendents or fair staff.
- Your superintendents will try very hard to make sure there is room for everyone during fair.

BEDDING

- The fair will provide the first bedding for your beef animal's stalls. Any bedding needed after that is to be provided by the exhibitor.
- All tie-out bedding will be the exhibitor's responsibility.

BARN MEETING

• There will be a beef barn meeting just prior to beef weighin, Monday, August 1, please watch for the posting of meeting time in the beef barn.

BEEF JACKPOT

• There will be a beef jackpot show during the 2016 county fair. Classes available for market and breeding beef (with an entry fee). The jackpot will be held on Tuesday, August 2 at 2 pm.

There will be more detailed information available as fair time approaches.

BEEF FITTING RULES

- Please be familiar with the rules in the fair book for fitting your animal. We realize that some exhibitors are going to need some assistance when clipping their animal at fair; but with this we stand firm that it has to be a teaching experience, with the exhibitor doing the majority of the work.
- Due to the numbers of cattle in the barn, all fitting chutes will be located outside the barn. No fitting chutes will be allowed in the barn.

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- Exhibitors are to read and abide by Animal Health Requirements for goats. All market goats must have USDA/APHIS Scrapies identification tags in place prior to arrival.
- 2. Ownership, possession and tagging date for all market goats is June 1.
- 3. A) Market goats must be uniformly slick shorn with 3/8 inch of hair or less at the time of arrival on the fair-grounds. Legs may have hair up to the hock and knee only.
 - B) Market goat may be wethers or non-bred does.
 - C) Market goats are to have milk teeth in place or may have lost one or both of their milk teeth, but there shall be no evidence of breaking skin or eruption of the two permanent front teeth.
 - D) Market goats should be dehorned. If horns are present the horns are to be blunted and not exceed two inches in length. No fresh dehorning will be allowed at the show.
 - E) No artificial color, paint or powders to be used on market goats.
- Market goats must weigh a minimum of 60 lbs., with no set upper weight limit. Underweight market goats will

be allowed to show for ribbons and premiums but will not sell. Animals will be weighed one time. No weighbacks will be allowed.

- All market goats will be checked for properly placed Fremont County Fair designated ear tags and/or tattoos at processing.
- 6. Exhibitors are allowed to use halters or collars when showing their market goat.
- Classes using natural or logical weight breaks, will be established by the Show Committee following the weighin/ processing of the market goats.
- 8. Goates entered in the market goat show are not eligible to show in the breeding show and vice versa.
- 9. Market goats are to be of a meat breed type, no dairy goats.
- 10. The Fremont County Fair does not condone excessive bracing, slapping, or lifting the legs of market lambs/ market goats in the show ring or while on grounds. The slapping or lifting of market goats in the show ring is not allowed. All goats must have four feet on the ground during the judge's inspection or handling. Lifting feet off the ground or placing feet on any support or altered ring surface is not acceptable. Exhibitors will receive one warning if they are found lifting or slapping goats. Second offense will result in automatic exhibitor and animal disqualification.

 - **C** All market goats eligible for this show MUST be owned by a bonafide Fremont County 4-H or FFA member in good standing according to the by-laws of those organizations and must be properly nominated and entered in the Fremont County Fair Youth Market Goat Show.
 - **D**. Proof of eligibility must be provided by June 10 by submitting a completed form per goat nominated as , Bred, Fed and Owned.
 - **E**. All bred, fed and owned goats must be nominated and tagged at an official Fremont County tagging. The nomination form must be sent to the Fremont County Fair office by July 8, 2016. For more information please call 307-856-6611.
 - **F.** NO entries will be accepted that were not properly nominated and entered by June 10. Goats entered in this show must be designated for the Bred,Fed and Owned class.
- Youth Market Goat Superintendent must be notified at weigh-in (Youth Market Goat processing at 11:30 a.m., Monday, August 1 of the eligibility/proper entry of each Bred, Fed, and Owned entry.
- 3. A special placing ribbon will be presented to the top placing Bred, Fed and Owned market goat from each recognized Youth Show market goat class. YOUTH HORSE SHOW RULES

- Exhibitors are to review and abide by all Youth Livestock Rules in this competition guide.
- Equine Animal Health Requirements are to be met by each exhibitor. Any horse suspected of ill health may not be allowed on the fairgrounds or may be immediately dismissed from the fairgrounds.
- Youth Horse Show Halter and Performance Classes are open only to qualified Fremont County 4-H/FFA members.
- 4. All policies of the current Wyoming Youth Horse Rule Book, distributed by UW Cooperative Extension, apply unless superseded by specific rules in this guide. Exhibitors are to be familiar with this rule book and this guide.
- 5. Family Owned Horse: The family owned horse is defined as one horse that can be shown by multiple members of the direct family (only siblings, no cousins, etc.) Each member must be certified and endorsed to compete on that horse. The horse will be allowed to be shown/run once per youth age category (Jr., Intermediate and Sr.) in each of the horse show events (i.e. showmanship, performance classes, stock classes and timed/speed events).
- Unsportsmanlike conduct will not be tolerated and the offending exhibitor will forfeit all awards and/or premiums and may immediately be dismissed from fairgrounds.
- 7. Horse stalls are limited on grounds. Stalls will not be available prior to 6:00 pm, Thursday, July 21, 2016. Horse exhibitors who would like a horse stall must turn in a stall application to their community leader. Those exhibitors who must travel a long distance will be given first priority to stall horses on grounds during the show. Stall assignments will be made by the Horse Show Superintendent. Stalls are to be vacated by Sunday, July 24 (unless prior arrangements have been made in writing and confirmed with the horse show superintendent). Stalls are to be striped clean upon departure. A fee of \$20.00 will be charged for stalls not sripped clean.
- 8. There will be NO STALLIONS allowed in the Youth Horse Show.
- A) 4-H SAFETY CERTIFICATION IS REQUIRED FOR EACH HORSE THAT A 4-H MEMBER PLANS TO COMPETE WITH IN THE 2016 STATE FAIR YOUTH HORSE SHOW.
 - B) VERIFICATION OF COMPLETION OF THE FFA SAFETY TEST IS REQUIRED FOR AN FFA MEMBER TO PARTICIPATE IN THE 2016 STATE FAIR YOUTH HORSE SHOW.
 - C) WORKING COW HORSE ENTRIES SHOULD HAVE COMPLETED SOME TRAINING IN THIS CLASS (A, B AND C MUST BE VERIFIED BY 4-H EDUCATOR OR FFA ADVISOR).
- Halter classes will be judged on the American System and ribbons will be awarded. Breed Champions may be selected, but there will be no overall champion selected.
- 11. No more than 25 entrants, at one time, will be allowed to show in any showmanship or performance classes.

- 12. In halter classes, no more than two horses in a class may be exhibited by any single exhibitor. Only one entry per class may be made in a performance class.
- 13. Exhibitors must be able to control their horses on the grounds at all times.
- 14. Any protest must be lodged at the time of the infraction. Disqualification in the ring will be made prior to class placement. The superintedent wil be responsible for rule enforcement.
- 15. 4-H and FFA members competing in this division must certify that they have owned or leased their horses by no later than May 1, 2016.
- 16. Halter classes: In reference to horse's age, its birthday should be considered as being January 1 of the year in which it was born, and it then becomes a year old on January 1 of the year following its birth. For example: A foal born any time in 2015 will be a yearling on January 1, 2016. If born anytime in 2012 it will be a four year old, on January 1, 2016.
- 17. All quality animals in halter classes are eligible to show at the Wyoming State Fair. All horses entered in Halter and Performance Classes at the State Fair must be the same horse the exhibitor showed at the County Fair.
- 18. The class title "Any Other Breed" is for purebred horses of specific breeding other than those named. For example: A quarter horse-thoroughbred cross should be entered in the breed class the horse most resebles, not "Any Other Breed". It is the exhibitor's responsibility to present crossbred or questionable anmals to the Show Committee for a visual appraisal and a decision before the horse is shown.
- 19. Please refer to the patterns in the current Wyoming Junior Horse Show Rule Book.
- 20. Classes may be combined the day of the show at the discretion of show management.
- 21. Halter classes will show as posted on show day.

22. Safety Guidelines:

- A. The safety of youth exhibitor and their horses must be kept foremost in mind of all participants in this horse show
- B. All horse safety rules, regulations, and guidelines shall be adhered to at all times. Due to space and time limitations, all of the safety expectations cannot be listed within this publication. However, a few of the basic and most important safety expectations are listed below.
 - 1. 4-H members must complete the safety part of the 4-H Horse Levels Program before they can participate in the Youth Horse Show at the Wyoming State Fair. FFA members must pass the FFA Safety Test before they can participate in the Youth Horse Show at the Wyoming State Fair.
 - 2. Safety helmets certified by the American Society for Tesing and Material and the Safety Equipment Institute (ASTM/SEI) are mandatory for all English events that require a club member to be mounted on a horse.
 - 3. Safety helmets (ASTM/SEI certified) are recommended for all Western events that require a club member to be mounted on a horse.

- 4. Safety helmets (ASTM/SEI certified) are highly recommended for all speed events and classes that involve stock animals such as Working Cow Horse, Cattle Boxing, Team Sorting, or Roping Events.
- 5. Heeled boots are required anytime a club member is mounted on a horse. This helps prevent an exhibitor's foot from sliding through a stirrup and getting caught. Smooth sole boots are required anytime a club member is mounted on a horse. This helps prevent an exhibitor's foot from getting caught/hung up in the stirrup.
- 6. Bareback riding is not permitted.
- 7. In halter classes or any other time an exhibitor is working around a horse, he or she shall stay in the safety zones and the lead rope shall not be dropped.
- 8. Running, loud playing, and other similar activities are not allowed near horses, especially at a show, workshop, camp, or other place that is unfamiliar to horses that are already nervous and jumpy due to unfamiliar surroundings.

23. Youth Requirements

- A. If a youth is eligible to be in Wyoming 4-H and the FFA Program, he or she is eligible for enrollment in the Wyoming Horse Project, as long as he or she complies with the guidelines of the program.
- B. A member shall be properly enrolled in the horse project.
- C. A member is expected to maintain a record on the horse project, attend the required club meetings, and actively participate in local programs.
- D. Club members are also expected to abide by the general rules and regulations of the association or associations with which they have membership. Furthermore, they are also expected to abide by the rules and regulations stated within this publication.

24. Animal Requirements

- A. The possession/ownership date for horses utilized by club members for exhibition at the Fremont County Fair and the Wyoming State Fair is May 1, of the current club year. Therefore, the regulations and guidelines stated within this publication can only be applied beginning on May 1 of each current year.
- B. These are commonly asked questions and situations concerning the ownership and possession of a horse by club members:
 - (1.) Can a horse travel to a trainer's facility and participate in a camp, clinic, or school for a short or long period of time? A horse and rider can go any where and participate in any activity they desire over any length of time. As long as a horse and rider are together, the educational benefit is received, and, in fact, an exhibitor will learn more from daily contact with a trainer than in any other way.
 - (2.) Are there any travel restrictions regarding a horse and exhibitor during a possession period? There are absolutely no travel restrictions for a horse or an exhibitor during this period. However, they must be together.

- (3.) Can a horse be boarded at a trainer's facility? Boarding at a trainer's facility or any other facility is acceptable if a youth is doing the majority of the work. A leader or educator must satisfy his or her own mind that this is occurring.
- (4.) Can a trainer be allowed to take a horse to train with very limited contact with a youth? If a trainer has a horse all of the time for the purpose of either training or boarding and a club member has limited contact with the horse, then the horse and the youth are ineligible to participate in a club activity since the educational benefits of owning a horse are not met. As stated in item "C," a youth must be doing the majority of the work for it to be an acceptable club project.
- (5.) Can trainers haul horses for youth exhibitors to breed, to participate in open horse shows, or to participate in youth shows? No restrictions have been placed on the transportation of a youth owned or leased horse to and from any type of horse show or any other type of activity.
- (6.) What is the policy on vacations, injuries to a horse, injuries to youth, breeding of broodmares, or other activities that might separate a horse from a youth? The intent is not to cause any inconvenience to any exhibitor or limit participation in the horse industry. Therefore, activities that are normal to a family in the horse industry are considered acceptable. However, all questions arising in relation to these types of situations should be checked out in advance with a leader or educator to assure full participation in club activities.
- C. Whenever a question on horse ownership, possession, or identification arises, a club member along with a club leader or CES educator share the responsibility to provide proper documentation of ownership, possession, or identification.
- D. Any infractions, as determined by the Fremont County Fair Board or County Horse Committee, will disqualify said horse during the contract year from showing or competing in any county or state club contest.
- E. Ponies shall measure 58 inches or under at the withers. No exceptions are allowed. All ponies must be measured before showing. Ponies measuring more than 58 inches high, will not be allowed to show in any pony class.
- F. The two associations for miniature horses (American and International) have different height require ments. As a result, the horse project will use the one with the higher height requirement as that is more inclusive for club members and the horse program. Therefore, miniature horses shall not measure greater than 34 inches at the withers. Those measuring greater than 34 inches but less than 58 inches, will be classified as a pony (see the previous item, E).

25. Showing Guidelines

A. At the Fremont County Fair Horse Show,each exhibitor may only enter one horse per performance class. However, exhibitors may enter two different horses

- in halter classes. NO ADULTS ARE TO RIDE, LEAD OR GROOM HORSES AT THIS FAIR!
- B. Poor sportsmanship will not be tolerated in any show. An exhibitor can be asked to forfeit premiums and may be immediately dismissed from a show, if the show committee has determined poor sportsmanship occurred.
- C. A youth member is expected to fit, groom, and ride his or her own animal at all horse shows. If fitting assistance is needed, only a regularly enrolled club member is allowed to assist (not do the work) his or her fellow club member.
- D. In the interest of safety, a parent, leader, or another club member may saddle, bridle, or make tack changes to a club member's horse. However, the club member must be present and assisting with this activity. Further more, any additional assistance is a violation of this rule and must be reported to the show committee before an animal enters a show ring. A decision by the show committee will be made before the animal is allowed in the ring.
- E. Exhibitors who do not have their horses under suitable control shall be excused from the ring. Judges and ring officials should stress safety in a courteous manner to all exhibitors in a class.
- F. A fall to the ground by a horse or by a rider is cause for disqualification. A horse is considered to have fallen when its shoulder makes contact with the ground. A rider is considered to have fallen when he or she is separated from a horse in such as way as to require remounting.
- G. Imposition of a penalty for unsoundness is at the discretion of a judge or superintendent. If it is severe enough to impair the required performance, a judge can disqualify a horse and a rider, by excusing them from the show ring.
- H. Barrels and poles may not be used as markers in any class except barrel racing, pole bending, stake race, and trail class.
- I. Junior riders are defined as being 8-10 years old and they will not be asked to mount after a dismount.
- J. Intermediate riders are defined as being 11-13 years old and they will not be asked to mount after a dismount.
- K. Senior riders are defined as being 14-18 years old and they may or may not be asked to mount after a dismount.
- L. No attendant shall be allowed in the ring except at the request of a judge.

26. Equipment

- A. Clothing and tack should reflect a neat, clean, and well-fitted appearance. Expensive clothing and/or expensive tack are not required nor expected. Silver or fancy equipment will not count over neat, clean, well-fitted, and workmanlike equipment.
- B. A ring steward and/or a judge may inspect equipment as riders enter a class, and they may allow an

- exhibitor to change from unacceptable equipment to acceptable equipment.
- C. A judge may also prohibit equipment deemed severe or dangerous.
- D. Lack of required equipment shall be cause for disqualification.
- E. Tack and Attire for Western, Speed, Cattle, and/or Roping Events:
 - 1. **Personal Wear:** Western hat or approved safety helmet Western boots with heels (Fat Baby boots are not acceptable), long pants, and long-sleeved shirt. In speed events, cattle events, or roping events a safety helmet is highly recommended. However, if using a Western hat, a restraining method should be used.
 - 2. **Tack**: Western stock saddle and Western bridle with curb bit used with split or romal reins. Horses 5 years of age and younger may be shown in a snaffle bit or braided rawhide, braided leather, or rope bosal with split reins. (Refer to the Wyoming manual entitled 4-H Horse Project for identification and description of curb and snaffle bits.)
- 3. **Holding the Reins**: When riding horses 5 years of age or younger with a snaffle bit or bosal, two hands must be used on the reins. When riding with a curb bit, a hand should be around the reins. One finger between the reins is permitted when holding split reins. With a romal, no finger is permitted between the reins, and there must be at least 16 inches of rein between the hands. "Tom Thumb" or shanked snaffles are still standard bits and are to be ridden with one hand.
 - 4. **Optional Tack**: Spurs, chaps, raincoat, breast collar, and hobbles in riding classes.
- 5. **Prohibited Tack**: In all classes (except cattle or roping classes), ropes or reatas (riatas) and draw reins are prohibited. In classes other than speed events or cattle/roping events; closed roping reins, hackamore bits or mechanical hackamore, running martingales, tie-downs, nosebands, whips, bats, or quirts are prohibited. In all Western horsemanship (equitation) and trail classes, all horse boots and leg equipment are prohibited.
 - 6. **Curb Chains**: Curb chains are permissible but must be at least 1/2 inch wide and lay flat against a horse's jaw. A flat leather strap at least one inch wide also is acceptable.

F. Tack and Attire for English Events:

- 1. Coats: Hunt coat of tweed or melton or light-weight summer jacket in conservative colors such as navy blue, dark green, gray, black, or brown are permitted.
- 2. Pants: Must be breeches or jodhpurs in traditional colors such as buff, khaki, canary, rust, light gray, or white.
- 3. Boots: High hunt boots in black or brown (rubber boots are allowed) or Jodhpur boots.
- 4. Hat: An approved black or brown safety helmet (ASTM/SEI certified) with a safety harness of leather or plastic permanently attached to or en

- compassing a helmet is required for all English classes. (An elastic chin strap is not allowed or acceptable.) The most recently approved safety helmets are highly recommended and much preferred over older helmets.
- 5. Shirt: Ratcatcher shirt with choker or stock tie for girls, button-down collar shirt and a four-in-hand tie for boys.
- 6. Hair: Shall be neat and contained (as in a net or braid).
- 7. Gloves: Optional.
- 8. Saddle: Acceptable saddles include all-purpose, forward-seat, or hunt seat (in the Programmed Ride a dressage saddle may also be used). These shall be used with an approved English Girth and may be used with or without padded flaps. Also, a saddle may be used with or without a pad. If a pad is used, it should be an English style and should properly fit the saddle.
- 9. Bridle: An English bridle with a cavesson noseband and leather browband will be used with a snaffle, kimberwicke, or pelham (with two reins) bit. A full bridle of the afore mentioned type may also be used.
- 27. **SAFETY**: SAFE HORSEMANSHIP GUIDELINES MUST BE FOLLOWED AT ALL TIMES DURING THE YOUTH HORSE SHOW to protect exhibitors and spectators. Unsafe practices will be prohibited (eg. riding double, riding bareback, riding with halters only, riding at a speed greater than a walk outside of arenas, etc.). All animals must be under control at all times during the Youth Horse Show. Unruly animals may be excused.
- 28. **ENTRY INFORMATION**: The Class Code must include Division number and Class number. **EXAMPLE**: If you are entering an Paint Mare in Class 059, your class entry would be: 1607-074 (1607 for Halter Horse Division and Class 059 for Paint Mare foaled in 2014).

SHOWMANSHIP POLICIES

- 1. Previous Champions in Horse Showmanship are eligible to compete again in the same organization and same class.
- 2 Showmanship is open to Senior, Intermediate and Junior4-Hexhibitors. One Junior, one Intermediate and one

Senior may be designated from each county to attend State Fair. To attend 4-H exhibitors must be selected to represent their county and entry must be made by respective extension educators.

- No stallions or lactating females will be allowed in any Showmanship event. Showmanship contestants must show their own animals. Animals must meet ownership requirements and be carried as a current 4-H/FFA
- Members may compete in the Showmanship contest in both 4-H and FFA divisions, if age and youth program eligible.
- Judging will be on the basis of exhibitor's ability to present their animal for judging, including the movement and positioning of the animal and condition and cleanliness of the animal, as it relates to being ready for show. Mannerisms and conduct of the exhibitor are also
- Preparation and showing of 4-H animals must be consistent with the Fitting Policies as stated in the 4-H Section of this guide.

HALTER CLASSES - POLICIES

- 1. Halter classes with less than three (3) entries may be combined with successive classes (within sex and breed) at the Show Committee's discretion. Classes having three or more horses will be established the night before the halter show.
- 2. Individual horses may be entered in one halter class only. NO DOUBLE ENTRIES.
- 3. To qualify as a pony, wither measurement must not exceed 58". Overheight entries will not be allowed to show as a pony. Only one measurement allowed.
- 4. Any Other Breed class is for purebred horses of specific breeding, other than those named. For example, a Quarter Horse-Thoroughbred cross should be entered in the breed class the horse most closely resembles, **NOT** Any Other Breed (AOB).

NOTE: It is the exhibitor's responsibility to present crossbred or questionable animals to the Show Committee for a visual appraisal and decision BEFORE the show. Unapproved animals untypical of the class entered may be dismissed from the ring with the exhibitor being disqualified and all privileges forfeited.

- ENTRY INFORMATION: The Class code must include the department letter, the Division number and Class number. - 7. "Any Other Purebred" rabbit entered must look like the breed it is entered as and representing in the show.
- 8. If an animal is shown in fur class, it must be shown in its respective breed class. Animals disqualified for reasons other than health may still show in fur class. Fryer fur animals should be shown out of a meat pen only.

POLICIES

- Lambs entered in this division may be either ewes or wethers.
- 2. All Market Lambs must be totally and uniformly slick shorn by July 30, prior to arrival on grounds.
- Classes will be established by the Show Committee following weigh-ins, using natural or logical weight breaks, attempting not to exceed 20 head per class. Market lamb classes with less than three (3) entries will be combined with the next like class.
- Market Lambs must weigh a minimum of 100 pounds. Underweight lambs will be allowed to show for ribbons and premiums, but will not sell. No weigh-backs allowed.
- 5. All Market Lambs are to be born in 2016 and must have all of their lamb teeth in place.
- All market lambs must not show any signs of active club lamb fungus. Any lamb with active fungus must be removed from the fairgrounds
- Market lambs must be properly castrated; no cryptorchid or ram lambs. Final decision of proper castration by species committee at weigh scale.
- 8. Any lamb showing signs of rectal prolapse shall be disqualified and must be immediately removed from the show area by the exhibitor.
- 9. Market lambs are not allowed to have any artificial color, paint or powders used on the animal.
- 10. The slapping or lifting of market lambs in the show ring is not allowed. All lambs must have four feet on the ground during the judge's inspection or handling. Lifting feet off the ground or placing feet on any support or altered ring surface is not acceptable. Exhibitors will receive one warning if they are found lifting or slapping lambs. Second offense will result in automatic exhibitor and animal disqualification.
- 11. Speckled Face lambs: Wool Breed Crossbred These are generally a cross between a wool breed and a Blackface (meat) breed. Lambs should show significant evidence of their wool breed ancestry. Skin will appear pink, white wool, brown/black spots in conjunction with wool on legs below the knees/hocks, significant brown/ black spots on the face plate. Being wool crossbreds, may also be smut faced (light dirty brown mottling on the face and legs). Black Face Crossbreds-These are generally a cross between a blackface (meat) breed and a whiteface meat breed. Lambs will be black pointed. like a blackface breed; legs, ears, head, and belly will primarily be black. Will have significant white spotting on face plate, ears and below the knees/hocks. Blackface lamb entries will be grouped into multiple weight categories, from lightest to heaviest.
- 12. All Youth Market lambs will be processed, classified and weighed. Classification (Whiteface; Speckled Face;

- Blackface) and weighing of all market lambs will be Monday, August 1, at 1:30 p.m. Each Lamb is allowed only one trip through for verification, processing and weighing.
- 13. Water containers with fresh water must be available to lambs, in their pen, at all times.
- 14. Drenching as a method to source nutrition for an animal is prohibited. Only in the case of a licensed veterinarian prescribing, in writing, an animal health need to utilize drenching, is to be considered acceptable while at Fremont County Fair.
- 15. There will be no muzzles, of any type, allowed on youth livestock unless approved in writing by a licensed Fremont County, Wyoming veterinarian and presented to the specific species superintendent.

GENERAL FFA POLICIES

All entries in the Department must be from a Fremont County High School Agricultural Education Department and must be certified FFA projects. All members and chapters must be in good standing with the Wyoming State Association.

- Read carefully the "General Policies & Procedures" of Fair. FFA exhibitors and advisors will abide by all applicable policies.
- All entries are due in to the Fair office by 5:00 p.m., Friday, July 8. All exhibits must be checked in and be in place no later than 7:00 p.m., Thursday, July 28. Exhibits shall not be released until 9:00 am, Sunday, August 7.
- FFA member project entries in Agronomy, Ag Mechanics and Classroom should be made out in the member's name and member's complete address must be included.

- 4. All FFA Chapter entries in Agronomy, Ag Mechanics and Classroom should be made only in the chapter name with complete chapter address.
- Disorderly conduct, fighting, insubordination, etc. will result in action taken by the Fair Board and/or Chapter Advisor.
- Livestock Fitting Policy: An FFA member is expected to fit their own animal. However in the interest of safety and education, an FFA member may be assisted by another bona fide Fremont County 4-H or FFA member.

Assistance is defined as a learning situation where the person doing the assisting is teaching the FFA member a technique in fitting or showing. This person is allowed only to show the FFA member the proper skill or techniques, and the FFA member is expected to perform the majority of each technique/skill required. Violations of this rule must be reported to the Show Superintendent before the animal enters the ring. A decision by the Show Committee will be made before the animal is allowed to enter the ring.

If an FFA member is found to be in violation of the fitting rule, they will be disqualified from competttion in any FFA or Youth Show Division contest at the Fremont County Fair, including Showmanship Contests.

- 7. Absolutely no mistreatment of animals will be tolerated and infractions may result in immediate dismissal of member from the grounds.
- ENTRY INSTRUCTIONS: The class code must include the Department number, the Division number and Class number. EXAPLE: If you are entering Agronomy in Noxious Weeds; your class entry would be: 17-1702-004.
 17 for FFA Department; 1702 for Agronomy Division; 004 for Class 004-Noxious Weed.

Note:

A Chapter may only have one chapter entry number.

FFA AGRICULTURE MECHANICS DIVISON 1701

Policies

- Entries will be judged on the basis of workmanship, evidence of sound planning, number and degree of skills involved, practicality and agricultural usefulness of the entry.
- 2. All entries must be student's work and result from the training program in Agriculture Mechanics.
- 3. The judges reserve the right to re-enter entries in classes in order to make up more judgeable groups of entries.
- 4. Judges shall give greater consideration to an item built entirely by the student rather than a pre-fabricated item.
- 5. Entries in Class 1 must be mounted on display boards that may be any size less than 2 feet by 4 feet. Display boards may represent several students' work. Points from these classes will have equal value with other similar classes in judging sweepstakes. Individual items

- not mounted will not be judged. Boards not meeting the specifications will be placed lower than those boards that do.
- 6. All entries must be removed from equipment and placed in proper class area to be judged. Example: pickup bumpers and stockracks.
- 7. All projects not of quality will not be judged. This will be left to the discretion of the Agriculture Mechanics Committee. The items must be removed from the display area.
- 8. Any entries in the Agriculture Mechanics Class that are found to have been shown in a previous year fair will disqualify that chapter, for all premiums, for the current year, in the Agriculture Mechanics show. The Agriculture Mechanics Committee shall have the responsibility for making this decision.



2016 JR. LIVESTOCK SALE RULES Fremont County Fair Junior Livestock Sale Board

- Consignors must be Fremont County 4-H or FFA Members in good standing, who have exhibited their animal at the current Fremont County Fair.
- 2. ALL MARKET LIVESTOCK MUST HAVE BEEN TAGGED AT OFFICIAL FREMONT COUNTY TAGGINGS. If an animal looses it's tag, a sale committee member must be notified as soon as possible and before entering the fairgrounds. All 4-H and FFA advisors will be made aware of scheduled dates and locations annually. Exhibitors are responsible for obtaining information about location and dates for tagging, as well as for ensuring their market animals are tagged. This is not the responsibility of leaders or advisors.
- All animals must meet the specified market weights as follows:

a. Beef: Minimum sale weight Steers 1,000 lbs;

Heifers 950 lbs.

b. Goats: Minimum sale weight 60 lbs. Goats will be

sold by the pound.

c. Lambs: Minimum sale weight 100 lbs.

d. Poultry: Minimum sale weight Fryers 3 1/2 lbs. per

bird; Maximum 6 lbs. per bird.

Minimum sale weight, Roasters 6 lbs. per

bird. (not over 20 weeks old)

e. Rabbits: Minimum sale weight 3 lbs.,

Maximum 5 lbs. per rabbit

f. Swine: Minimum sale weight 225 lbs. Maximum sale weight 310 lbs.

Hogs weighing over 310 lbs. will not sell.

- The Fairgrounds scales will be the official scale. Weights taken over your species designated scale will be official and will be the sale weights.
- All animals offered for sale must meet current USDA Market Standards and Wyoming Livestock Board Rules and Regulations.
- CONDITION OF SALE ANIMALS All animals offered for sale must conform to the USDA WHOLESOME MEAT ACT.
 - a. All animals must be in good health and carcasses free of drugs and chemical residues.
 - b. Antibiotics and sulfonamides have met the required withdrawal periods.
 - c. Drug label directions for use and withdrawal periods must be followed.
 - d. If drug and other chemical residues are found in the tissue of a carcass, the entire carcass may be condemned. If drugs or other chemical residues are found in tissues of carcasses of animals sold through the sale connected with the Fremont County Fair, said Jr. Livestock Sales Board will in no way be liable or responsible for the condition of the carcass or sale price of the animals.
- 7. The exhibitor shall sell his or her own animal, with emer-

- gency situations being decided by the Jr. Livestock Sales Board.
- 8. An exhibitor will be allowed to sell one animal (beef, lamb, swine, market goat) except rabbits and poultry which are sold as a pen of three animals.
- 9. HOW TO CONSIGN YOUR ANIMAL FOR SALE:
 - a. The sales board representative will be located in the mutal scale house.
 - Office hours for consigning will end one hour following the swine, lamb, goats, rabbits, poultry and beef shows.
 - c. All consignments will be handed in <u>at the scale</u> <u>house</u>, not at the Fair Office.
 - d. If you are showing only one animal and wish to sell it, you must consign that animal.
 - e. When to consign: You must consign your chosen animal to sell within one hour following the respective market show. For example: If you are selling your market hog, as soon as the hog show is over, you need to consign your hog with the Sale Board member or representative in the scale house. If you are thinking of selling your hog, but are showing a beef as well and might want to sell the beef instead, see the Sale Board member or representative and inform them that you may want to sell your hog immediately following the show. Inform them that your are showing a beef and may want to sell it instead. Do this for any animal you may be consigning.

CONSIGNMENTS WILL CLOSE ONE HOUR AFTER THE BEEF SHOW ON FRIDAY, AUGUST 5, 2016. IF YOU ARE SHOWING A MARKET ANIMAL AND DO NOT WISH TO SELL IT AT THE JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SALE, PLEASE INFORM THE SALE BOARD REPRESENTATIVE.

*IF YOU PLAN TO SHOW AN ANIMAL AT THE WYO-MING STATE FAIR, YOU MUST INDICATE SO ON THE CONSIGNMENT FORM. YOU MUST HAVE THE PERMIS-SION OF YOUR EXTENSION AGENT OR FFA ADVISOR IN ORDER TO SHOW AT THE WYOMING STATE FAIR.

- If an exhibitor is fortunate enough to have two animals of different species that are Champion or Reserve Champion he/she may sell both animals.
- All re-sales will have to be verified by a Jr. Livestock Sale Board member at the RLAsale barn. Set delivery times will be announced upon receipt of sale date information from Riverton Livestock Auction.
- 12. All rabbits and poultry must be delivered live and in good health, according to the buyer's direction.
- 13. Dress Code: Collared shirts (cap sleeve, short sleeve or long sleeve no sleeveless) that button up to the neck, polo shirts. Not allowed: T-shirts, tank tops, halter tops, tube tops. No Mid-riffs (stomachs) showing. No shorts. No sandals. You will be asked to leave the sale and change if you do not adhere to the dress code. No exceptions.
- The Jr. Livestock Sale Board will automatically deduct a set percentage from the gross sale price of each animal.

- All animals sold through the Jr. Livestock Sales Board will automatically be covered by the sales board for a period of 45 days.
- After the Junior Livestock Sale, each exhibitor is required to take his/her animal home for extended feeding and rest.
- 17. All related costs are sellers responsibility until the animal is delivered.
- 18. On Monday, August 8, following the fair, call the fair office at 856-6611. Double check on who your buyer is. Ask if the animal is to be processed, resold or delivered to buyer. THE BUYER, NOT THE SELLER, DESIG-NATES THE PROCESSOR. IT IS YOUR RESPONSI-BILITY TO DELIVER THE ANIMAL TO THE DES-GNATED PROCESSOR ON THE SCHEDULED PRO-CESSING DATE.
- 19. Enforcement Clause: Failure to follow these rules will be reviewed by the Fremont County Fair Jr. Livestock Sale Board and appropriate action will be taken. Actions may include loss of sale privileges for current or subsequent years at the Fremont County Fair Jr. Livestock Sale. All Fremont County Fair Jr. Livestock Sale Board decisions shall be final.
- 20. Write a thank you note to your buyer. Thank you notes shall be delivered to the Sale Board representative on sale day or within 10 days following the sale, at the fair office. Thank you note should be unsealed, with proper return address, indicating seller's name and properly addressed to the buyer.
- 21. Sellers may expect to receive their check 30-60 days after Fremont County Fair Junior Livestock Sales Board has received the buyer's check. No checks will be issued prior to September 10. No checks will be issued to exhibitors that have not submitted the buyer "Thank You" note, as per item 20 above.

Rules

- Only regularly enrolled or officially transferred Fremont County 4-H members are eligible to exhibit in this department. If you are not a 4-H member, you may enter in the Open Show section of this guide.
- 2. Exhibits must be part of the current project year.
- HOW TO ENTER THE FAIR use the entry form for Department 18 in the back of this guide. Contact the 4-H office for a sched-uled Help Day- Please Attend! You will be able to get your fair information at this time

- and turn in your entry forms. We will be open for help filling out forms and answering any questions you have about fair.
- A. Pick up an entry form from a 4-H Club Community Leader, the Extension office, or the Fair Office. (ONE COMPETITION GUIDE PER FAMILY).
- B. Use one entry form per exhibitor. If you have more exhibits than spaces to enter them on your original entry form, use a second blank entry form and staple them together before turning them in. Do not use the back of the entry blank or other paper. Only items entered properly on an official entry form will be entered into the Fair. Use the entry form titled Youth Exhibits for static (project) entries, but no livestock entries on this form.
- C. When filling out your entry form, use care. Your age is determined as of January 1 of the current year. Use this age to determine what age class you enter. If you have other questions, please ask before filling out your entry blank. Mark in your competition guide the classes you are going to enter. Fill in the entry form and have your club leader double check it. *Reminder: Age as of January 1, 2016.

Junior: 8 - 10 years of age Intermediate: 11 - 13 years of age Senior: 14 - 18 years of age

- D. If two or more entries are allowed in any one class, be sure to write that class code and description on your entry form as many times as you have entries.
- E. HAVE YOUR PARENT(S) OR GUARDIAN SIGN THE ENTRY FORM. Entry Forms that are not signed will not be accepted by the Fair office. No exceptions.
- F. Enter Online at www.fremontcountyfair.org. Go to the FAIR tab, scroll to Enter Online click on 2016 Online Entry. Set up account with name, address, phone number and email. Be sure to enter all Static exhibits under Department 19 and all Livestock exhibits under Dept. 16. When entering online be sure to use care and make sure you have entered all items correctly. Once you have completed your online entry you will receive an email confirmation. If you do not see all the items you entered call the fair office to verify or go back online and enter missed entries.

4. GETTING YOUR EXHIBITS TO FAIR:

- A. Pick your entry tags up from the Fair Office (check master schedule for pickup time). You should have one tag per item entered.
- B. Attach your tag(s) to your item(s) before you bring your entry to Fair. When possible attach the tag to the upper left corner. Please read rules for each division for any specific entry information. Please Do Not Punch, Staple Or Damage The Tag In Any Way.
- C. Pictures, posters, and display boards must have a hole punched in the top for hanging. Follow the guidelines as described in the division.

5. WHEN AND WHERE EXHIBITS ARE DUE:

Refer to the Master Schedule or department for all arrival times and locations.

6. INTERVIEW JUDGING:

This is an opportunity for the exhibitor to sit down and visit with the judge while the judge evaluates their exhibits. This is a positive learning experience for the exhibitor, with parents being encouraged to accompany exhibitors. If the exhibitor is unable to attend, their exhibits will still be judged and written comments will be provided.

Interview judging is used to give 4-H youth a chance to look back at their experience critically and to encourage thinking, working harder and ultimately learning more thoroughly, than just showing or telling.

Judges should keep in mind that they want to encourage the 4-H participant. Help them find ways to make their project better by suggesting "other ways" to accomplish their goal. Try to be positive about things that were done incorrectly.

The judge will check to see that the 4-H participant has learned more than just how to make a project. They want to see evidence of the Do, Reflect, Apply!

4-H members DO their project prior to fair, but interview judging then gives them a chance to REFLECT on their project. They get to tell about what they did, how they did it, as well as, what went good or not so good, along the way. They also get to tell what they learned from their experience and how they might APPLY what they learned to shape new goals for the future.

The judge will ask questions about the project; this is not a presentation. Each member will spend approximately 10 minutes with the judge. If they cannot make the interview judging, their project will still be judged.

Here are some sample questions that may be asked:

- a. How many years have you been doing this project in 4-H?
- b. What did you think you might learn from taking this project?
- What did you like most about this project? What did you like least?
- d. Did anyone help you decide what your project might
- e. What new things did you learn?
- What new tools did you use that you have not used
- g. How do you plan to use what you made?
- h. What would you like to learn next year?
- What was the most difficult part of your project?
- What other things did you do in this project? j.
- k. What did you learn about yourself?
- What did you learn about your decision making skills?
- 7. Each 4-H participant will receive a placing ribbon for each project exhibited:

First Place Blue: Red: Second Place White: Third Place

STATE FAIR Quality Purple:

(no added premium)

All Purple ribbons are considered for "Best of Show".

There will be one (1) "Best of Show" for each division: Senior, Intermediate and Junior. These usually have an award donated by individuals or by the Friends of Fair. Special ribbons are also given to the "Top 10%" in the project, which includes Best of Show.

8. STATE FAIR EXHIBITS:

- A. Release Forms: Any items qualifying for State Fair will require a release form. You must sign a release form. If you are not provided a release form at the judging table, stop by the Extension Secretary table before you leave interview judging and sign a release form.
- B. Transportation of State Fair qualifying items:. Please consult the Extension Office to verify how or if your item will be transported to State Fair. Some items are too large or fragile to transport with all other entries. If this is the case, you will be responsible for arranging to transport your own qualifying exhibit to State Fair. Be sure to check with the Extension Office about your qualified exhibit. It is your responsibility to double check on whether your item has been transported. All efforts will be made to transport as many items as possible, but check on your item before you leave Fair and be sure it is being transported or arrange other options with the Extension Office.
- C. Ribbons & Awards: It is your responsibility to remove your ribbons from exhibits traveling to State Fair. Remove the ribbons on Sunday, prior to your item being taken to State Fair, if you wish to retain it. No ribbons will be left attached to any item traveling to State Fair. If you are to receive a special award for your entry, a claim card will be attached to your item. This claim card is to be turned in to the Fair Office and you must sign for your special award. Please do so Friday, or Saturday during fair, until Sunday, August 7, exhibits release until 3:00 p.m. Do not remove your entry tag! This is the only means of identifying your exhibit.

4- H CLOVERBUDS **DEPARTMENT 18 - DIVISON 1801**

HISTORY: The "Cloverbud" program was started in Fremont County in 2011 to benefit younger youth who are very intererested in the 4-H educational experience.

REQUIREMENTS: Youth must be 5-7 years in age as of January 1 of the current 4-H year. In order to become a member of Cloverbuds, the children must be signed up for the project at the Fremont County Extension Office or through an established 4-H club leader. Partcipants are encouraged to show at least two exhibits at the Fremont County Fair in this division.

CLUBS: Cloverbuds may belong to a regular 4-H club as a Cloverbud member or they may belong only to the county Cloverbud program. They can be involved in both, depending on the pref-rence of leaders and parents. As members of a club they may participate in most activities. The county program follows the suggested guideline of regular 4-H projects to give them a basic introduction to the format of a 4-H club and related activities.

PROJECTS: It is recommended that Cloverbuds have two (2) projects. A simplified record book is supplied for the members and assistance is provided in filling out the record in easy steps.

CLOVERBUD PROJECTS: These projects are limited only to the child's imagination! Some examples are: Cooking, Sewing, Painting, Drawing (any media) Clay, Paper Mache, Models, Bead Work, Woodwork, Tie-Dying, Bread Art, and Buas.

General Rules and Regulations: All rules and expectations for Youth Livestock and 4-H Show animal exhibitors will be applicable to the Fremont County 4-H Cat Show.

- 1. The "Household Pet" cat is of mixed breed or uknown descent.
- A purebred cat is one belonging to a recognized breed with characteristics maintained through generations of unmixed descent; may be registered with a recognized registry.
- 3. Kittens must be at least 4 months old and not older than 8 months of age. Adult cats are older than 8 months of age. Because of susceptibility to disease, no kitten under 4 months of age will be accepted for competition and should not be brought to fair.
- 4. No pregnant or nursing cats may be entered.

- 5. All cats and kittens must have their claws clipped. Declawed cats may enter the show and will not be counted down for declawing.
- 6. Do not enter your cat if you feel it will not be easily handled by the judge.
- 7. Each cat or kitten must be wearing a harness or collar (not a safety collar) and a leash. The exhibitor must always wear the leash on their wrist for safety reasons.
- 8. Exhibitors must furnish their own carpet square during judging. Exhibitors must provide a proper cage or carrier for their cats/kittens. Exhibitors must bring their own litter and litter box.
- 9. All exhibitors should wear long sleeve shirts or blouses with trousers or skirts. No shorts.

Health Requirements:

All cats must be accompanied by a current Rabies vaccination certificate, stating that the animal has been vaccinated by a veterinarian in accordance with current recommendations of the Compendium of Animal Rabies Control as prepared by the National Association of State Public Health Veterinarians (NASPHV). It is strongly suggested, but not mandatory, that all entries have the combination vaccinations, plus feline leukemia. Vaccinations should not be received within three weeks prior to the show.

Cats found to be ill or with parasites (fleas, ear mites, etc.) will not be allowed to show and will be dismissed from the grounds.

No cat or kitten should enter if any (feline) infectious or contagious disease existed in the household within three weeks prior to the show date.

Showmanship- members winning showmanship at county fair or as the county 4-H Educator designated youth representative - Champion Junior,Intermediate and Senior are eligible.

Obedience - receiveing a qualifying score of 170 or above.

Conformation - members placing in the top 4 at county fair.

Agility, Obedience and Rally - must compete at the same level at the State Show that they qualified for at the county level

- 4-H members should have the sole responsibility of training and competitive showing of each dog during the current 4-H year. Any infractions, as determined by a review committee, could disqualify the dog from the show.
- All dogs must be at least 6 months of age by May 1 to compete at the State 4-H Dog Show and 1 year of age by May 1, for agility classes. Exhibitors should have a copy of their 4-H dog ID forms with them for this show.
- 4. All animal entries must be accompanied by an official health certificate issued at the point of origin by an accredited veterinarian. Certificates for dog entries must show current immunization as per state veterinary guidelines. No animals will be allowed to exhibit at the Fremont County Fair or the Wyoming State Fair without a valid current Animal Health Certificate.
- 5. All dogs must be on leash (excluding competition) and under control at all times. Fair rules prohibit any dog from being any place but the campground and the site of the dog show. Dogs must not be taken near the livestock barns. Once the 4-H dog show is completed, all dogs must be removed from the grounds.
- 6. Vicious/Aggressive dogs will be dismissed from the ring and must be removed from the show grounds.
- 7. Females in season will be allowed in classes. However, they will go through at the end of all classes.
- 8. Spayed, monorchid and neutered dogs may be shown without judging discrimination.
- 9. Dogs must be clean and well groomed.
- 10. The show committee reserves the right to ask anyone violating these rules to leave the competition.
- 11. No class will be held up for a contestant in a different county fair event.
- 12. Entries for Rally classes and Agility classes will need a current Wyoming 4-H Jump Height card at check in to verify correct class entries.
- 13. Youth Age classifications are: Junior (age 8 to 10) Intermediate (age 11 to 13) and Seniors (age 14 to 18).

Section 2- OBEDIENCE

- A 4-H member may compete in only one obedience class per dog, with a total maximum of two entries (dogs). The First dog is referred to as the "A" dog. The other is referred to as the "B" dog for class entries.
- 2. The first-year beginner novice class is for members who are in their first year of the dog project, not the first year

- with a new dog. It is designed as a training class for members who do not feel competent to start in the On Leash class. Members may compete in the first year beginner novice class only once.
- 3. A 4-H exhibitor with a dog shown previously in obedience classes by another 4-H handler or an obedience title must show the dog by these guidelines:
 - a. Junior and Intermediate age exhibitors may move back or down one level.
 - b. Senior age exhibitors must show the dog at the highest level the dog has achieved previously.
- 4. A dog receiving a qualifying score of at least 170 points at county fair may advance the following year to the next higher class but must advance after receiving 3 qualifying scores. Once the higher level of obedience is selected for the dog, the member may not drop back to the lower level with the same dog.
- 5. High In Trial will be calculated on the basis of the raw score, plus 5 additional points with each increase in level of difficulty. Award will be presented to High in Trial.
- 6. Score Sheets: The Wyoming 4-H dog score sheets were designed for the benefit of 4-H members. They are intended as guides for judges. Judges use their discretion in deciding the seriousness of errors.
- 7. All dogs must enter/leave the show ring and compete with a six-foot leash.
- 8. Bait is not allowed in obedience competition.
- 9. Dogs soiling or urinating in the ring during judging will be disqualified.
- 10. Males and females will be shown in the same class. Females in heat will be shown last in the class and must be kept away from the obedience ring until call time.

- 3. Exhibitors entering more than one dog in any class may be assisted only by another 4-H member (from the same club, if possible), if the dogs must be shown at the same time.
- 4. Classes 012-019 will be judged according to AKC standards, but it is not necessary that dogs be registered; they must be purebred, with both animal parents of the same breed.
- 5. Classes 020 and 021 are for cross-bred dogs parents of different breeds and will be judged according to the pre-dominant breed characteristics and/or soundness, gait, condition and grooming.

- Preparation and showing of animals must be consistent with the Fitting Rules in the front section of this 4-H Competition Guide.
- 6. No boars, stallions, bulls, or buck/billy goats will be allowed in any showmanship event. Rams (sheep) may be shown. No lactating animals will be shown except for dairy animals (cattle & goats).
- 7. Judging will be on the basis of exhibitor's ability to present their animal for judging, including the movement and positioning of the animal, as well as condition and cleanliness of the animal, as it relates to being ready for show. Mannerisms, conduct of the showman; fitting and industry knowledge are also considered by judges.
- 8. Special Species Exhibitor Rules:
 - A. Fitting/grooming for all species. It is expected that the fitting, grooming, and preparation of the animal be done by the youth exhibitor and will be considered by the judge.
 - B. Fremont County Youth **Beef** Showmanship is a Blow and Show (Unfitted) event. Unfitted is defined as no compounds used on hair, hooves or skin. Clean, dry, combed hair is acceptable.











ShowAwards: JR/YR & SR - Rosettes 1st - 6th place (see rule #7).

Rules and Info:

- 1. **USEF and 4-H / FFA** Rules apply. Informal dress is acceptable. English tack and attire is normally used at Dressage Shows. The JR/YR division may use the 4-H / FFA rules for Programmed Ride Test 1 & 2, Intro Level Test A & B and Training Level Test 1 & 2. Refer to the Wyoming State 4-H / FFA Rule book, under Programmed Ride. English riders ASTM / SEI certified helmets and heeled boots are required. Western riders ASTM / SEI certified helmets are strongly recommended and heeled boots required. The required helmets will be available on-site.
- 2. Tests may be called by a reader outside the ring.
- 3. Show management may cancel, change, combine or split classes, change jump heights or change arena size if circumstances require it.

- 4. **Entries Closing Date**: Post marked July 14, 2016. No entries will be accepted over the phone. Post entries will only be accepted if space and time permits.
- 5. Entry form must be completed entirely and full payment of fees must accompany the entry form. All signatures are required.
- 6. **Substitution** of rider, horse, ride time or class will be made only at the discretion of show management.
- 7. You can ride the same test twice per horse/rider combination. No more than 4 tests may be ridden per horse per day. When entering a Ribbon class twice, the first test of the 2 will be used for placing.
- 8. Ride Times will be assigned and posted at the show office or dressage arena. To receive your personal list of tentative ride times before the show, include your e-mail address on your entry form. Please check the Official Ride Time Schedule posted at the show office or dressage arena on show day for possible changes. Please be at the dressage arena at least 10 minutes prior to your scheduled ride time. Failure to enter the arena within 90 seconds after the judge rings the bell signaling the rider to enter the arena results in disqualification. No exhibitor can be required to ride before his or her scheduled time. If circumstances permit, you may request or agree to ride earlier than your scheduled time.
- 9. Tack may be checked before or after entering the arena at the discretion of the show management.
- 10. Exhibitor may never warm up nor ride in the official dressage arena, except when called by the judge to ride his or her test.
- 11. Exhibitor may warm up around the outside of the official dressage arena while the judge is scoring the previous test ridden. During tests, please walk and stay at least ten (10) feet away from the dressage arena.
- 12. In the case of inclement weather, show management may set up time blocks for warm-up inside the official dressage arena if the show is held at the CWC indoor arena.
- 13. Class results will be posted when class is completely scored and placed. Tests will not be released nor shown until a class is posted. No test will be released to anyone but the rider or rider's representative. Riders are encouraged to check their test for errors.
- 14. Show management reserves the right to refuse the entry of any exhibitor for cause; to have any horse removed from the grounds for cause; to return any entry fee and eliminate the exhibitor for cause; all being without any liability for damage or compensation.
- 15. **Scratches:** Refunds will be made only upon presentation of a written statement from a veterinarian or medical doctor attesting to illness or injury. Statement must be received prior to the day of the show. NO EXCEPTIONS.
- 16. Fair Grounds Stabling: On grounds, 8x8 covered box stalls (a few 8x16 stalls) \$10.00 per night, bring your own shavings. You must strip the stall clean after use. Out of County Horses stabled on grounds must provide a copy of Neg. Coggins Test taken within 12 months. Stallions and unruly horses may have to be stabled off grounds. Exhibitors who must travel a long distance will be given first priority to stall horses on grounds during the show. Please complete the stabling form. Stall assignments will be made by arrangements with Darlene Vaughn.
- 17. **Lameness:** In the case of marked lameness the judge informs the exhibitor that he or she is disqualified. There is no appeal against the judge's decision.
- 18. Veterinarian and Farrier List: Posted at the Show office.
- 19. Concessions: Near the Show, but not on grounds.
- 20. Accommodations and Directions: Available at the Fremont County Fair web site, www.fremontcountyfair.org
- 21. Exhibition Class: Exhibition only, may be done, not judged.

IN ADDITION: The Fremont County Fair requires all horses entering the fairgrounds to have a current health certificate. These will be inspected prior to allowing entry with your horse. We will let you know the location for inspections via e-mail prior to the show.
